Define the project in broad terms: **where** (even a vague list of places), **with whom**, **when**, with **which aim**, in which context (urban, periurban, rural)... etc.

A projet is **never created alone**: once your idea has born, share it with your friends, your trusty circles to create a solid group of motivated people.

# 4 Organise the plantation (min 1 month)

You are almost done! It's time to broadcast information about your project to let more people get involved and help to create the forest, i.e. planting!
